Membership

- Faye Fagel CFC members expressed appreciation for Faye Fagel's service to the youth of Marion County and her service and leadership in serving on the commission. In addition, Faye served as chair of the Youth Resource Action Team. A farewell party for Faye will be held on July 31, 2017, from 4-6 p.m. Faye will be presented with a plaque for her service on the CFC. All commission members are invited to attend.
- Ormond Fredericks the CFC steering committee nominates Ormond Frederick to fulfill Sam Osborn's remaining CFC membership term. (June 15, 2017, steering committee meeting).
 - o Sam Skillern moved that Ormond Frederick fulfill Sam Osborn's remaining CFC membership.
 - Sue Bloom second
 - Those present unanimously agreed. In the absence of a quorum, no official action was taken. However, a recommendation of appointment will go before the Board of Commissioners.

Information: Department of Human Services Child Welfare division is in transition. Sam Osborn is on a new assignment. Ormond Fredericks will serve as District 3 Child Welfare Manager. Clyde Saiki, DHS director, will retire in the fall. Fariborz Pakseresht, will become the DHS director in September.

Family Preservation Action Team

- Every Child FPAT Leadership Role
 - Every Child, a private organization that works with Department of Human Services to find safe, nurturing places for children in crisis to flourish, has been contracted by DHS to recruit foster parents, support DHS staff/offices, and provide opportunities for community involvement. Every Child would like to identify a backbone organization to house a staff person to support the work of Every Child. There would be no funding attached to this position; so, the backbone agency would be responsible for raising the funds to cover the position.
 - FPAT has been asked to assist:
 - Create a scope of work for an Every Child staff position
 - Develop a Request for Information/Interest for the backbone organization
 - Select the backbone organization
 - Currently the focus has been on the faith community; however, the backbone organization can be outside the faith community.
 - Provide guidance and counsel to Every Child and the backbone organization
- Eliminate the Gap Recruitment and Retention of Foster Parents Strategic Plan
 - o Foster Parent Champion is needed to coordinate with key partners to execute the strategic plan
 - Identify funding
 - Identify a host organization
 - Preferable an outside organization
 - Marion County could hold a contract; however, they could not hire as an employee.
 - Discussion:
 - Salem Leadership Foundation was unable to serve as the Every Child backbone organization. The geographic footprint of Every Child extends beyond the service area of Every Child.
 - Every Child and the Foster Parent Champion will not be a combined position; it will, most likely be placed in different organizations.

 - Analyze the effects of stress, perceived discrimination, etc. One-third of the respondents reported that they have experienced perceived discrimination (age, gender, or race).

- Carla Willamette Valley Community Health (WVCH) (listen to tape at 1:10 minutes)
 - o WVCH has reorganized its community structure and transformation program.
 - Grant cycle is currently open and aims to fund transformation projects: clinical integration and community investment. First round application submission closes: August 14, 2017
 - Projects requesting funding under \$25,000 have a rolling deadline. Applications will be reviewed quarterly.
 - Community Investment projects priorities are based on the Community Health Improvement
 Plan: depression, reducing tobacco use, timely access to prenatal care, and obesity.
- Sam Salem Leadership Foundation
 - Bike Boulevard Action Team getting people moving
 - Affiliated with the North Neighborhoods Community Partnership Team
 - Bike Boulevard (walking and biking) will begin at the Oregon School for the Deaf and end at the Oregon State Capitol.
 - Open Streets Celebration on September 23, 2017. Locations: Highland and Grant Elementary Schools, Broadway Commons, and at the Saturday Market.
- Jayne Center for Hope and Safety
 - Recent event: opened the Grant neighborhood shelter up to the community to visit. In 39 years, more than 15,877 clients were provided safety in the Grant neighborhood shelter.
 - o New shelter is now in operation. Grant neighborhood shelter is for sale.
- Cary Marion County Health Department
 - o Psychiatric Crisis Center (PCC) has served both children and adults for more than 20 years
 - In August, the Children Crisis Services will move out of PCC into the Children's Behavioral Health service area. System of Care partners helped to make this happen. Partners are: DHS, Coordinated Care
 Organization, Salem Health, Options Counseling, and Christian Community Placement Center.
 - Extended hours to help with acute placement
 - Child and family friendly service and location
- Judge Pellegrini Marion County Juvenile Court
 - Views the courtroom as a clearing house. The suggestion of community resources comes from the bench.
 - Asked for input on who is on the ground providing services to youth?
 - The courts can be the champion for programs that serve youth.

 - New Police facility all services will be housed in one location
 - o Received a grant to fund a local emergency services vehicle
 - Volcanoes Health and Safety Kids July 21, 2017 gates open at 5 p.m. game starts at 6:30 p.m.
