PRESENT:

Commissioner Janet Carlson, Commissioner Kevin Cameron and Commissioner Sam Brentano. Also present were John Lattimer as chief administrative officer, Gloria Roy as county counsel and Kristy Witherell as recorder.

Commissioner Carlson called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

PUBLIC COMMENT

- Alleges a Marion County Public Works truck illegally passed him while bicycling;

Board Discussion:

- The Commissioners signed a letter of support creating a scenic bikeway that runs from Detroit to Estacada; and
- The Commissioners Office will follow up with Public Works to make sure the drivers are operating safely.

PRESENTATION

New Marion County Website – Jolene Kelley, Gary Christofferson, Jim Kitterman, Morgan La France

Summary of Presentation:

- New website went live Monday, September 28, 2015;
- Actively involved with redesign for 18 months;
- Consulted with White Horse Productions;
- Added navigational tools to better find information and appropriate departments for customers of Marion County;

- Added functional improvements in addition to the modern look;
- Highlights the beautiful scenery in Marion County;
- Made website accessible to mobile devices;
- The menu bar never leaves the screen;
- Search feature has ability to search the entire county website;
- More user friendly than previous website;
- Created an alerts and emergencies ribbon that is displayed across the top of the page only during emergency situations around the county; and
- Web steering committee will continually focus on maintenance of the website.

Board Discussion:

- White Horse Productions did a great job helping with a concept;
- Board Session meeting documents are on the website;
- Employee directory is a new feature to the website;
- Mobile site is very user friendly;
- Information Technology Department did a phenomenal job with the new website; and
- Ms. Kelley will forward the new website information to the Association of Oregon Counties.

PUBLIC WORKS

MOTION: Commissioner Cameron moved approval of the consent agenda. Seconded by Commissioner Brentano; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

Commissioner Carlson moved the Board of Commissioners action item to the last agenda item.

BUSINESS SERVICES

- 1. Consider approval of the Health Plan Renewals Plan Year 2016. Justine Flora *Summary of presentation:*
 - The Health Insurance Study Committee (HISC) meets quarterly to review health insurance options;
 - All insurance plans renew January 1 of each year;

- Marion County offers three health plans through Moda;
- Offers two dental plans;
- Offers two health plans through Kaiser Permanente;
- The Marion County Law Enforcement Association (MCLEA) insurance plan came in a zero percent increase after bargaining;
- 7.2 percent increase on Non-MCLEA preferred provider organization (PPO) plan;
- HISC committee did some adjustments to the program to reduce increases:
 - o Preferred provider plan down to a 6.7 percent increase; and
 - o Kaiser program down to a 3.2 percent increase.
- Recommends renewing the programs.

Board Discussion

- New health plan will start January 1, 2016;
- Open Enrollment will start October 13, 2015;
- Marion County has a composite rate which is one rate for all employees:
 - o The cap is \$1,346 per member per month.
- The goal of the HISC is to find insurance plans that get as close to the \$1,346 to minimize the employees share;
- Raised copays with urgent care, lab and x-ray, emergency room, hospitalization and outpatient services;
- Preventative services are still at no cost;
- The Health Savings Account (HSA) program is a pretax savings opportunity to use for any out-of-pocket expenses associated with healthcare:
 - o Money can roll over from year to year; and
 - Can put in up to 50 percent of the deductible.

MOTION: Commissioner Brentano moved approval recommendation to adopt alternative health plan renewal options, adopt Health Savings Account (HSA) contribution continuation and adopt MCLEA renewal. Seconded by Commissioner Cameron; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY

2. Consider approval of a proclamation designating October 2015 as Domestic Violence Awareness Month in Marion County. – Walt Beglau, Kim Larson, Sara Brennan

Summary of presentation:

- Domestic violence awareness month is nationally recognized;
- Brings awareness and direct resources to victims who are affected by domestic violence;
- 11 people have been murdered in Marion County in a domestic violence situation;
- Marion County Public Safety Coordinating Council (MCPSCC) has agreed to support a position to fill the gap in the community to help victims of domestic violence;
- Working with Domestic Violence Council to reach out to the community to different faith programs:
 - o Provide training to different faith communities.

- Saturday, October 10, 2015 is the ninth annual Domestic Violence Walk/Run;
- Last year, the Center for Hope and Safety had 21,000 contacts to their program:
 - o The staff has grown to 18 employees;
 - o Website Hopeandsafety.org; and
 - o 24 hour hotline number is provided on the website.

Board Discussion:

- MCPSCC had the opportunity to review in detail services provided to victims in Marion County:
 - o Deliberated on services for Marion County;
 - o House Bill (HB) 3194 sets aside 10 percent of the county's allocations for victims services which is slightly over \$350,000 a biennium;
 - o Providers got together to determine how the dollars would be shared; and
 - o Provided a bilingual advocate to the Center for Hope and Safety.
- Marion County is at the early end of bringing more of an awareness of domestic violence in the community.

MOTION: Commissioner Cameron moved to approve the proclamation designating October 2015 as Domestic Violence Awareness Month in Marion County. Seconded by Commissioner Brentano; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

The commissioners read the proclamation.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE

3. Consider approval of the intergovernmental agreement with Oregon Department of Corrections (DOC) for Community Corrections Funding in the amount of \$22,825,763 through June 30, 2017. — Commander Jeff Wood

Summary of presentation:

- Every two years a community corrections plan needs to be submitted to the DOC;
- Provide a balance of supervision services and sanctions;
- The money serves as the foundation for Community Corrections and the foundation for Marion County for supervision;
- Baseline funding increased fairly substantially;
- The downside is allocation percentages fell 2 percent;
- The plan funds mental health assessments and sex offender notification and registration;
- A prison diversion pilot program has been created as set out in Senate Bill (SB) 416 for the last three years:
 - o Looking to expand the program;
 - Part of a randomized control trial in conjunction with the Criminal Justice Commission for that program;
 - o Been successful; and

- o 115 people have gone through the program with a recidivism rate of roughly half of expected with like population.
- On January 1, 2016, will be offering a sentencing alternative program in conjunction with the District Attorney's Office:
 - o Target high and medium risk, non-violent property and drug offenders who are primary custodians of children;
 - o Looking to divert the population to provide intensive services:
 - Parenting skills;
 - Drug and alcohol treatment;
 - Mentoring; and
 - Housing.
 - o Goal is to not disrupt the family unit.
- During the 2013-2015 biennium, intake scoring was changed due to budget cuts:
 - o Because of caseload considerations, the lowest level of cut off for general supervision was changed to limited supervision; and
 - Since the recovery of the recession, will now be able to re-instate the previous scores that are recommended by the Level of Service/Case Management Inventory.
- With the assistance of Legal Counsel and the Boards support, there has been an indemnification for the Sheriff:
 - With new staff, more people will be actively supervised.
- State plan was approved by the Marion County Public Safety Council on September 8, 2015; and
- The plan facilitates and promotes evidence based practices with a goal of lowering recidivism through positive change.

MOTION: Commissioner Brentano moved to approve the intergovernmental agreement with Oregon Department of Corrections Funding in the amount of \$22,825,763 through June 30, 2017. Seconded by Commissioner Cameron; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

- 4. Consider approval of the 2015-17 Justice Reinvestment Grant Program application for submittal to the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission. Commissioner Janet Carlson *Summary of presentation: (See Attachment A)*
 - Vision of House Bill (HB) 3194 was to create a policy around Justice Reinvestment in Oregon;
 - Caps offenders in state prison;
 - Divert nonviolent drug and alcohol offenders to be supervised in the community;
 - Focus on victims and offenders;
 - Savings of not building a new prison in Oregon would go to counties;
 - The De Muniz Resource Center was primarily used for people coming out of prison, now used for people in the jail program:

- o Resource center holds parenting classes;
- o Cognitive and Motivation classes; and
- o Integrating more evidence based practices with the target population.

MOTION: Commissioner Cameron moved to approve the 2015-17 Justice Reinvestment Grant Program application for submittal to the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission. Seconded by Commissioner Brentano; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.



JUSTICE REINVESTMENT BACKGROUND

- House Bill 3194 passed in 2013
 - Creates Justice Reinvestment policy for Oregon
 - Reduces prison costs and avoids new prison construction
 - · Focuses on offenders and victims
- Savings invested in counties to divert property and drug offenders from state prison
- Grant funds managed by Oregon Criminal Justice Commission
- First allocation in 2014-15 while rules developed

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JUSTICE REINVESTMENT GRANT PROGRAM


- Legislature approved \$38.7 million for counties for the 2015-17 biennium
- Marion County's biennial allocation is \$3,534,081
- Grant application released July 15
- Applications due October 14
- 10% dedicated to victims
- 3% dedicated to statewide evaluation (Randomized Controlled Trials or RCTs)

JUSTICE REINVESMENT GOALS

- Reduce prison populations
- Reduce recidivism
- Increase public safety
- Increase offender accountability

ALLOWABLE USES

- 1. Community-based and evidence-based strategies
- 2. Local criminal justice system mapping
- 3. LPSCC collaboration, engaging in Regional Implementation Councils

Justice Reinvestment Grant Application

TARGET POPULATIONS

- Total community corrections <u>need</u> in Marion County calculated at \$36 million annually:
 - Does not include circuit court and prosecution costs
 - · Full cost of county jail is included in this figure
- 3,700 on parole and probation in Marion County
- 600 released from prison to Marion County each year



Justice Reinvestment Grant Application

TARGET POPULATIONS

- 92% of those released from prison are Marion County residents
- Focus is on clients with high and medium risk, using evidence-based practices in three categories:
 - Prison diversion strategies
 - Recidivism reduction strategies
 - Public safety strategies





LOCAL PUBLIC SAFETY COUNCILS

- Law requires local public safety councils to create and submit application
- Marion County Public Safety Coordinating Council and Marion County Reentry Council spent a year developing both plans

Parameter 4: Council assists non-funded programs (grants, support, advocacy)





PRISON DIVERSION STRATEGIES

Senate Bill 416 Prison Diversion Program -\$1,272,140

Diverts high and medium-risk property offenders from state prison. 110 clients in 2013-15, 11.3% recidivism rate.

Jail Reentry Program - \$473,376

90-day treatment and mentoring program, prepares inmates at Work Center.

- Marion County Adult Drug Court \$40,000 Partially fills budget gap for client urinalysis tests.
- Potential Protocol Changes \$0 Data presentations to set state for protocol adjustments focused on downward departures and probation revocations.



RECIDIVISM REDUCTION STRATEGIES

Link Up - \$223,822

Mentoring and treatment services for reentry clients with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders.

Student Opportunity for Achieving Results (SOAR) -\$461,646

Intensive 12-week cognitive-based program on Chemeketa Community College campus.

De Muniz Resource Center - \$100,686

One-stop reentry resource center assists with employment, identification, housing, education, legal, and basic needs.



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RECIDIVISM REDUCTION STRATEGIES

Transition Services/Housing - \$126,171

Rental assistance stipends for an additional 60 clients for up to three months.

Substance Abuse Treatment - \$228,000

Treatment for reentry clients that addresses addiction and criminogenic risk

Family Support Program - \$42,060

Focuses on families with young children where family has been impacted by incarceration.



PUBLIC SAFETY STRATEGIES

Victim Services - \$100,000

Bilingual victim advocate will assist with restraining orders and supportive services.

Data System Upgrade - \$3,750

Additional programming to Community Data Link will generate improved reports to





SET ASIDES

10% Set Aside for Victim Services - \$353,408

Shared between two qualified nonprofit providers to increase mental health therapy and children's advocacy services.

3% Set Aside for Evaluation - \$106,022

Remitted to Oregon Criminal Justice Commission for statewide RCTs.
