PRESENTATION

Ron Lierman – Vice-Chair, Silver Falls School District

- School district encompasses about 240 square miles;
- 13 schools, eight are rural kindergarten through eighth grade schools, two charter schools and a high school;
- Higher than average in reading and math;
- 82 percent graduation rate over four years, 93 percent over five years;
- Allow parents to move children across boundaries to attend schools;
- Allow children from Salem, Keizer and Stayton to attend Silverton schools;
- Average teacher experience level is 14 years;
- 99 percent of teachers are highly qualified;
- Partnership with Oregon Garden;
- Businesses in community are very supportive of local athletic teams;
- High level of parent volunteers; and
- Community effort to replace football field with artificial turf:
 - o Fundraising effort not paid with tax money.

Stacy Palmer – Executive Director, Silverton Chamber of Commerce

- Partnership between SEDCOR, City of Silverton and Chamber of Commerce:
 - Working on a Business Retention and Expansion project; and

- Working with community volunteers to interview select businesses about their future business plans.
- Working on tourism initiatives with the Oregon Garden, Silver Spur and Silver Falls State Park:
 - o Attract bike friendly tourists to the area; and
 - o Group working on history identifying placards and signs throughout downtown.
- Tree lighting ceremony took place in Town Square park with more than 1,500 people in attendance;
- Silverton Chamber of Commerce is working with Travel Salem to help promote tourism; and
- Oregon Garden does a great job with communicating with the local businesses when a large event is being held.

Bill Miles - Chief, Silverton Fire District

- One of the community's oldest volunteer organizations;
- Established in 1883;
- Special purpose district governed by a five-member board;
- The current district is a result of a merger between the Silverton Fire Department, Silverton Rural Fire District and Scotts Mills Rural Fire District;
- Encompass 106 square miles;
- Five stations;
- Annual budget is \$2,000,000;
- 65 dedicated volunteers and seven paid staff;
- Last year, responded to 924 calls;
- Responded to 890 this year;
- Volunteers are the backbone to providing service to the community;
- Recruit volunteers year round;
- Respond to:
 - o Structure fires:
 - o Medical aid:
 - o Car accidents;
 - o Hazardous materials; and
 - o Wildland fires.
- As of the first of December, Silverton Fire District made the last payment to the 1995 general obligation bond; and
- Last May, community supported the fire district with a new bond.

Randal Thomas - Chair, Oregon Garden Foundation Board

- Christmas in the Garden has a new attraction:
 - o Ice skating rink which is located in the pavilion.
- Receiving a lot of regional media coverage:
 - Alaska Airlines Magazine and Auto Club Magazine has provided quite a bit of coverage.
- Live reindeer will be at the garden December 10-13, 2015;
- So far, 8,467 people have attended Christmas in the Garden:

- o That is 2,729 more people that have attended than last year.
- The next big event will be the Quilt Show from January 22-24, 2016.

Mark Hunter – Development Director, Oregon Garden Foundation

- There are 35,000 plants in the garden:
- Last year, 125,000 visitors attended the garden;
- Membership has grown by 69 percent over the last year;
- 600 volunteers provide over 10,000 hours of service;
- 9,000 kids attend the education program throughout the year;
- Great wedding spot:
 - o 55 couples held their wedding in the garden last year.
- Looking at a comprehensive strategic plan:
 - o Looking at supporting the Oregon Garden in the future.
- Expanding into the Pettit property that includes an 18 acre lake; and
- Redesigning the education program to reach third and fourth grade children.

Ken Hector – Silverton City Council

- Appreciates the county's outreach in the community;
- Served on City Council for 28 years; and
- Long history of cooperation and collaboration between the city and the county.

PUBLIC WORKS

1. Adopt an administrative ordinance granting LA 15-002, regarding amendments to the Marion County Code, Title 16 (Urban Zone Code) – Joe Fennimore

Summary of Presentation:

- Purpose of revision is to reconcile the Zone Code with Ordinance #1357 regarding the keeping of chickens on land inside urban growth boundaries;
- The zone prohibits the keeping of poultry in residential zones;
- In Ordinance 1359, the county adopted standards that property owners must meet in order to keep hens on their property in residential zones;
- Ordinance 1357 became effective November 10, 2015 and now has codified at Chapter 6.15;
- The ordinance under consideration will amend the zone code to allow hens to be kept in residential zones if the standards in Chapter 6.15 are met; and
- The ordinance is prepared and notice of adoption was given on December 2, 2015 and is before the board for final adoption.

Board Discussion:

- Keeping of backyard chickens applies to properties that are zoned single family residential and urban growth boundaries;
- Most of those properties are in East Salem:
 - o Will affect 12 lots in Silverton; and
 - 23 lots in Woodburn.
- Can have hens in a fully fenced backyard, have to keep the coop clean, allows six hens per property with the exception of Silverton and Woodburn which the total is three;
- Code Enforcement handles complaints with backyard chickens; and
- Kept Marion County ordinance consistent with city ordinances.

MOTION: Commissioner Cameron moved that the chair to read the ordinance by title only twice. Seconded by Commissioner Brentano; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

Commissioner Carlson read the ordinance by title only twice.

MOTION: Commissioner Brentano moved to adopt an administrative ordinance granting LA 15-002, regarding amendments to the Marion County Code, Title 16 (Urban Zone Code). Seconded by Commissioner Cameron; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.
