MOTION: Commissioner Bethell moved to add an item to the Consent Agenda under Public Works: Approve the incoming funds Grant Agreement with the Oregon Department of Emergency Management for Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) funds in the amount of \$252,630 for the City of Jefferson Fire District Generator Project. Seconded by Commissioner Cameron; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

PROCLAMATIONS

HUMAN RESOURCES - Action

1. Consider approval of a proclamation designating the week of April 21-27, 2024, as Volunteer Week in Marion County. —Sherry Lintner and Marion County Sheriff's Office Acting Sergeant Jeremy Schwab and Cadet Dominic Peters

Summary of presentation:

- Over 1,300 individuals volunteer with Marion County every year:
 - o Approximately 90 county employees work with the volunteers in some capacity.

- National Volunteer Week is an opportunity to highlight the volunteers and the work that they perform;
- The Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO), Cadet Unit is one county program where volunteers contribute their time:
 - o The program provides youth with the following:
 - Enhances their education;
 - Law enforcement knowledge;
 - Leadership skills;
 - Teamwork; and
 - Responsibility.
 - O Youth ages 14.5 to 21 can partake in the program;
 - Youth are required to complete the MCSO Cadet Academy;
 - Cadets work alongside sworn officers where education related to the following is provided:
 - Law enforcement duties;
 - The criminal justice system;
 - Crime prevention;
 - Record keeping;
 - Radio communications;
 - Traffic control;
 - Event control; and
 - Officer safety.
 - The program prepares youth for a potential future in law enforcement.

- Youth may partake in ride-a-longs with MCSO Deputies;
- The program is a good opportunity to provide youth with a perspective into law enforcement:
 - o It teaches customer service skills; and
 - o Cadets interact with community members.
- MCSO Deputies invest their time to help youth succeed.

MOTION: Commissioner Willis moved to approve a proclamation designating the week of April 21-27, 2024, as Volunteer Week in Marion County. Seconded by Commissioner Bethell; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

The commissioners read the proclamation.

2. Consider approval of a proclamation designating April 22, 2024, as Earth Day in Marion County. –Brian May, Rachel VanWoert, and Yancee Gordon

Summary of presentation:

- Earth Day was first celebrated on April 22, 1970:
 - o The event's goal was to inspire appreciation of the nation's natural resources.
- The principles of the first Earth Day entailed:
 - o Creating environmental awareness and action;
 - o Inspiring scientific discovery and progress; and
 - o Assuring that the environment was recognized on a national level.
- Earth Day is a month-long campaign that focuses on:
 - o Waste reduction;
 - o Improving water quality; and
 - o Highlighting Marion County parks.
- The Earth Day celebration is the county's largest event that connects with community members:
 - o The event provides outreach and education.
- The 2024 theme for Earth Day is "Building a Brighter Future";
- Earth Day highlights things that community members can perform everyday including reducing, reusing, repairing, and reinventing; and
- Events for the month-long celebration include:
 - A Passport to Sustainability event which involves completing awareness activities; and
 - Scavenger hunts at local parks.

Board discussion:

• Commissioner Bethell suggested that Smokey the Bear be invited to the 2025 Earth Day celebration.

MOTION: Commissioner Bethell moved to approve a proclamation designating April 22, 2024, as Earth Day in Marion County. Seconded by Commissioner Willis; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

The commissioners read the proclamation.

6. Consider approval of the Purchase Order with Peterson Machinery in the amount of \$500,000 to provide parts and service repairs for heavy equipment owned by Marion County through April 14, 2027. –Dennis Mansfield and Michael Pierce

Summary of presentation:

- The Purchase Order (PO) with Peterson Machinery is for parts and service repairs for the county's heavy equipment;
- Staff is utilizing a nationwide Sourcewell cooperative for the PO;
- The PO's ending term date is April 14, 2027;

- The dollar value for the PO is \$500,000;
- The county has 16 pieces of Caterpillar equipment including:
 - o Bulldozers:
 - o Loaders; and
 - o Backhoes.
- Caterpillar requires parts to be sourced by an authorized dealer;
- Peterson Machinery is an authorized Caterpillar dealer that the county contracts with for the purchase of parts; and
- Staff recommends the board approve the PO with Peterson Machinery.

- Commissioner Cameron clarified that the PO is for an up to amount of \$500,000 for the next three years; and
- Keeping equipment maintained and running provides efficiency.

MOTION: Commissioner Bethell moved to approve the Purchase Order with Peterson Machinery in the amount of \$500,000 to provide parts and service repairs for heavy equipment owned by Marion County through April 14, 2027. Seconded by Commissioner Willis; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

7. Consider approval of the Construction Contract with Brown Contracting, Inc. in the amount of \$436,379 of which the state will fund an estimated \$380,000, and the county will fund an estimated \$56,379 to construct upgrades to existing pedestrian facilities for the Safe Routes To School (SRTS) Four Corners Elementary - Elma Avenue project through October 11, 2025.

Summary of presentation:

- The Construction Contract with Brown Contracting, Inc. is for the Safe Routes To School (SRTS) Four Corners Elementary Elma Avenue project;
- The project is located in the City of Salem, just east of Lancaster Drive, and near Oregon Route (OR) 22:
 - Construction will occur between Four Corners Elementary School and State Street.
- The existing conditions include:
 - o Limited sidewalks and pedestrian facilities; and
 - o A well-used crossing on State Street at the end of Elma Avenue.

- The project scope entails the following:
 - o Constructing five-foot wide sidewalks;
 - Constructing Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant curb ramps;
 - o Installing Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFB) with pedestrian pushbuttons;
 - o Constructing speed cushions with cut-throughs for emergency vehicles;
 - o Installing signage; and
 - Installing pavement markings as needed.
- It is estimated the project will cost \$436,379:
 - o An SRTS grant for \$380,0000 will be utilized; and
 - o The county will contribute an estimated \$56, 379.
- Brown Contracting, Inc. cannot utilize a travel lane and impact traffic until after the school year ends:
 - The contractor can use one travel lane during the summer months.

- Speed cushions are built for vehicles with larger wheelbases including fire trucks;
- It is important for vehicles to slow down in school zones; and
- Commissioner Colm expressed he feels the SRTS program is flawed and that it discriminates against the county's rural communities.

Motion: Commissioner Willis moved to approve the Construction Contract with Brown Contracting, Inc. in the amount of \$436,379 of which the state will fund an estimated \$380,000, and the county will fund an estimated \$56,379 to construct upgrades to existing pedestrian facilities for the Safe Routes To School (SRTS) Four Corners Elementary - Elma Avenue project through October 11, 2025. Seconded by Commissioner Bethell; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

8. Consider approval of the Construction Contract with Farline Bridge, Inc. in the amount of \$332,516 for the construction of a bridge at the Brown's Island Demolition Landfill through June 30, 2025. –Ryan Crowther and Andrew Johnson

Summary of presentation:

- The Construction Contract with Farline Bridge, Inc. is for the bridge located at the Brown's Island Demolition Landfill;
- The bridge is part of the access road into the landfill;
- A culvert at the site is starting to fail;
- The bridge will expand over the culvert to improve structural support for vehicles;
- Engineers have designed a bridge that spans the culvert, that will not impact the waterway;

- Farline Bridge, Inc. submitted the lowest bid of \$332,516 for the project;
- The project will utilize Marion County Environmental Services funds;
- The contract states the construction must be completed by June 30th:
 - o Access to the landfill has been impacted; and
 - o The construction timeframe will be short.

- The Brown's Island Demolition Landfill is currently closed;
- There is a large hole in the road where a portion of the culvert has already failed; and
- The county does not want heavy equipment utilizing the access road to drive in and out of the landfill site.

MOTION: Commissioner Bethell moved to approve the Construction Contract with Farline Bridge, Inc. in the amount of \$332,516 for the construction of a bridge at the Brown's Island Demolition Landfill through June 30, 2025. Seconded by Commissioner Willis; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

9. Consider approval of the Construction Contract with Farline Bridge, Inc. in the amount of \$3,824,332, in which the federal government will fund an estimated \$3,431,573.10 and the county will fund an estimated \$392,758.90, for the construction of the Hazelgreen Road NE: Pudding River Bridge project through January 31, 2026. –Ryan Crowther

Summary of presentation:

- The Construction Contract with Farline Bridge, Inc. is for the Hazelgreen Road NE: Pudding River Bridge project;
- This bridge spans the Pudding River;
- The county received multiple bids for the project:
 - o Farline Bridge Inc. submitted the lowest bid.
- The project is located on Hazelgreen Road between the City of Salem and the City of Silverton:
- The area gets inundated with flooding when the river is full;
- The project scope entails:
 - Completely replacing the existing bridge with a new structure that meets current standards;
 - o Constructing an approach guardrail; and
 - o Realigning Torvend Road NE to accommodate the new bridge:
 - The new bridge will be longer;
 - The longer bridge will impact the intersection;
 - The realigned intersection will be 90 degrees;
 - The current intersection is askew; and
 - It is anticipated that the 90-degree intersection will improve traffic flow.

- Hazelgreen Road will be closed during construction:
 - o Torvend Road will reopen by June 30th:
 - The contractor is required to complete construction on Torvend Road early so that neighboring properties are not impacted.
 - o The bridge will reopen by October 31, 2024; and
 - The project must be completely finished by November 30, 2024.
- Farline Bridge Inc. submitted the lowest bid of \$3,824,332:
 - The federal government will provide an estimated \$3,431,573 in funding; and
 - o The county will provide an estimated \$392,758.90 in funding.

- The contract has a liquidated damages clause if the construction deadline is missed;
- It is important that the area be available for the harvest season;
- Hazelgreen Road will be closed at the intersection;
- A detailed detour map will provide advanced warnings of the closures; and
- Access will be maintained for residents living in the construction area.

MOTION: Commissioner Willis moved to approve the Construction Contract with Farline Bridge, Inc. in the amount of \$3,824,332, in which the federal government will fund an estimated \$3,431,573.10 and the county will fund an estimated \$392,758.90, for the construction of the Hazelgreen Road NE: Pudding River Bridge project through January 31, 2026. Seconded by Commissioner Bethell; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE

10. Consider approval of Amendment #4 to the Purchase Order with Correct RX Pharmacy Services, Inc. to add \$150,000 for a new Purchase Order total of \$965,996.83 to provide pharmaceutical services to adults-in-custody at the Marion County Jail through June 30, 2024. –Lieutenant Jacob Ramsey

Summary of presentation:

- Staff is requesting approval of an amendment to the Purchase Order (PO) with Correct RX Pharmacy Services, Inc.;
- Pharmaceuticals are provided to approximately 415 Adults-In-Custody (AIC) at the jail;
- The number of AIC's requiring pharmaceuticals has increased over the past five years;
- The county is required to provide medical care for AIC's;
- Pharmaceuticals are expensive;
- The cost for pharmaceuticals can vary from one month to the next and is based on the following:
 - o The number of AICs at the jail;
 - o An AIC's medical issue; and

o The pharmaceuticals that are provided.

Board discussion:

- Additional medical treatment is needed as individuals are in custody longer;
- Medication is provided to some of the following:
 - o An AIC requiring dialysis for a kidney issue;
 - o AICs with mental health challenges; and
 - o AICs with Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV).
- The Oregon Board of Pharmacy oversees and certifies the jail pharmacy;
- The county contracts with a doctor; and
- Nurses distribute the medication.

MOTION: Commissioner Willis moved to approve Amendment #4 to the Purchase Order with Correct RX Pharmacy Services, Inc. to add \$150,000 for a new Purchase Order total of \$965,996.83 to provide pharmaceutical services to adults-in-custody at the Marion County Jail through June 30, 2024. Seconded by Commissioner Bethell; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

11. Consider approval of Amendment #1 to the Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with Chemeketa Community College to add \$123,263.27 for a new contract total of \$510,610.46 to provide Student Opportunity for Achieving Results (SOAR) program services to community corrections clients through June 30, 2025. –Undersheriff Jay Bergmann and Lieutenant Anna Jefferson

Summary of presentation:

- Amendment #1 to the Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with Chemeketa Community College is for the Student Opportunity for Achieving Results (SOAR) program;
- The additional funding provides for a SOAR staff member for fiscal year 2024-2025;
- The SOAR program is a collaboration between the following:
 - o The Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO);
 - o Chemeketa Community College (CCC); and
 - o Marion County Health and Human Services (MCHHS).
- The SOAR program was started in 2010;
- An estimated 887 individuals have participated in the program since its inception;
- The program's overall graduation rate is 56.8 percent;
- Clients are considered students of CCC;
- The MCSO chooses the evidence-based curriculum that is taught;
- SOAR program classes include:
 - o Cognitive restructuring;
 - o Pro-social skill building;
 - o Employment assistance;

- o Referrals to social services; and
- Referrals to educational services.
- SOAR staff is dedicated to helping individuals reenter the community; and
- The Oregon Department of Corrections recently evaluated the program:
 - o The overall score was 81 percent.

- Commissioner Bethell expressed the following:
 - She recently met with the MCSO to discuss:
 - The contract;
 - The SOAR program;
 - How the program operates;
 - Program expectations; and
 - The program's data.
 - It is important that the commissioners keep a pulse on things that are deployed to communities;
 - o Recidivism is important; and
 - Investment in the program is important.

MOTION: Commissioner Bethell moved to approve Amendment #1 to the Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with Chemeketa Community College to add \$123,263.27 for a new contract total of \$510,610.46 to provide Student Opportunity for Achieving Results (SOAR) program services to community corrections clients through June 30, 2025. Seconded by Commissioner Willis; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.
