1. Consider approval of a proclamation designating the month of May as Older Americans Month in Marion County. – Judi Richards and Charles Richards

Summary of presentation:

- Every year the federal government re-endorses May as Older Americans Month;
- The Older American Act was written in 1960;
- Federally funds programs not covered by taxes:
 - o Includes Meals on Wheels;
 - o Programs that deal with mental illness; and
 - o Physical fitness.

Board discussion:

• The commissioners appreciate the efforts of Ms. Richards and Mr. Richards.

2. Consider approval of a resolution establishing Marion County's dedication to an accurate and complete 2020 Census. –Lisa Trauernicht

Summary of presentation:

- April 1, 2020 is census day;
- Working with federal, state, and city representatives to promote getting an accurate count;
- Various programs in the county receive about \$1 billion annually from federal and state funds that are based on census numbers;
- The county has grown in the last 10 years;
- Funding helps with programs that impact the community:
 - o Medicare:
 - o Medicaid;
 - o Transportation;
 - o Schools;
 - o Housing; and
 - o Early child programs.
- There are hard to count communities in the county:
 - o Will be partnering with non-profit organizations for outreach.
- The county is partnering with cities and state to form a Complete Count Committee:
 - o For those who are interested in joining the committee please sign up through the website at MCCounts.com.

Board discussion:

- The state of California will be spending approximately \$220 million to get an accurate count:
- The funding received by the county is not included in the budget; and
- Important to get the census count correct in the county and state:
 - o Affects funding for smaller communities.

MOTION: Commissioner Willis moved for approval of a resolution establishing Marion County's dedication to an accurate and complete 2020 Census. Seconded by Commissioner Brentano; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

3. Consider approval of the Intergovernmental Agreement for incoming funds with Polk County and Yamhill County for \$525,000, Marion County to be the lead agency in a cooperative program for collection and management of household hazardous waste. —Brian May

Summary of presentation:

• The household hazardous waste facility is located on Highway 22, east of Interstate 5:

- o Constructed in 2004, and opened in 2005.
- Before the facility opened, hazardous waste was collected through satellite events;
- The facility is open every Thursday, and every other Saturday;
- It is a free service to Marion County residents;
- Last year there were over 34,000 customers that disposed of over 220,000 pounds of hazardous waste:
 - o 95 percent were Marion County residents.
- There is about a 20 percent increase every year in the use of the facility;
- The agreement allows the county to charge Polk and Yamhill County for their residents' use and not the customer directly:
 - o About \$74 per person.
- The cost to operate the facility annually is about \$350,000;
- Polk and Yamhill County has been cooperative in this endeavor and has also provided equipment for satellite collections; and
- The agreement is for five years, with an option to renew for an additional year.

Board discussion:

- There are not any permanent collection sites within Polk or Yamhill Counties:
 - Waste is collected through satellite events.
- The facility is located within the Salem-Keizer Recycling Transfer Station; and
- Residents will be asked for their zip code:
 - o Used for tracking purposes; and
 - o Charges for residents in other counties will be billed back to that county.

MOTION: Commissioner Brentano moved for approval of the Intergovernmental Agreement for incoming funds with Polk County and Yamhill County for \$525,000, Marion County to be the lead agency in a cooperative program for collection and management of household hazardous waste.
