MINUTES OF THE BOARD SESSION - Regular Session

PRESENT:

Commissioner Sam Brentano, Commissioner Patti Milne, and Commissioner Janet Carlson. Also present were Gloria Roy as county counsel and Kim Hulett as recorder.

PRESENTATION

Public Health Accreditation - Rod Calkins, Pamela Hutchinson

Health Department Administrator Rod Calkins said that this Public Health Accreditation would not have been possible without the truly visionary leadership that Public Health Division Director Pamela Hutchinson brought to the Public Health Accreditation process.

Ms. Hutchinson gave a PowerPoint presentation on the Public Health Accreditation program (Attachment A) and explained that the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) was formed to provide a national accreditation process to improve the quality of public health services across the nation. She said that the Marion County Health Department received its accreditation on March 19, 2014, and that Marion County is the first Health Department in Oregon to be accredited. She added that only 31 Health Departments across the nation have achieved the accreditation. Ms. Hutchinson also explained that accreditation means demonstrated accountability and improved quality for the community and recognized Health Department accreditation team members Jennifer Eskridge, Lyndsie Schwarz, and Carolyn Stegall who were critical to the accreditation process.

The Board of Commissioners and Chief Administrative Officer John Lattimer congratulated the accreditation team members on their accomplishment and thanked them for their hard work. Commissioner Brentano asked that any final report on the accreditation process be shared with the board. Commissioner Carlson requested a copy of the preliminary report. Ms. Hutchinson agreed.

Approve amendment #3 to add \$45,900 to Nathan Levin Co. to extend the lease for an additional two years with annual rental increases for the Health Department Alcohol and Drug Treatment Services.

PUBLIC WORKS

Notification of bid award of \$1,199,859 to Knife River Corporation – Northwest for construction of asphalt concrete resurfacing of various county roads.

PUBLIC WORKS - ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES

Approve amendment #1 to add \$41,360 to the Valley Landfills, Inc. contract to allow unscreened ash to be used as daily cover at Coffin Butte Landfill.

Approve amendment #6 to add \$447,400 to the Pacific Sanitation, Inc. contract to allow hauling of ash directly from the Waste-To-Energy-Facility to Coffin Butte Landfill.

MOTION: Commissioner Milne moved approval of the consent calendar. Seconded by Commissioner Carlson; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

Commissioner Carlson asked that Environmental Services Division Manager Jeff Bickford clarify that the "unscreened" ash that will be used as daily cover at Coffin Butte Landfill is actually going through a screening process. Mr. Bickford explained that the Waste-to-Energy facility uses both an eddy current system and conveyor belt system to separate and remove ferrous and non-ferrous metals from the ash before it is hauled to the Coffin Butte Landfill.

ACTION

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

1. Consider approval of an order approving Video Lottery Funds for Economic Development grants to Fiber-Fab, LLC for \$35,000, and Gilgamesh Brewing for \$35,000. – Don Russo

Economic Development Manager Don Russo requested approval of two Economic Development grant awards for the second cycle of fiscal year 2013-14. He said that the Economic Development Advisory Board (EDAB) has recommended grant awards to Fiber-Fab, LLC in the amount of \$35,000 and Gilgamesh Brewing LLC in the amount of \$35,000. He said that Fiber-

Fab, LLC is a manufacturer of fiberglass bathtubs and showers in Gervais, Oregon and that the grant funds would be used to purchase a ventilation system as part of their expansion to increase production. Mr. Russo said that Gilgamesh Brewing, LLC is a family owned business in Salem and that the grant funds would be used to increase production capacity through the installation of a bottling line and the purchase of new kegs. Mr. Russo added that EDAB's criteria was heavily based on job creation and both proposals scored higher in that area than the other proposals submitted.

Commissioner Carlson said that the board has had discussions in prior meetings about EDAB's grant application process and steps have been taken to ensure that the grant application instructions are clear for the next grant award cycle.

Commissioner Milne stressed how important the Economic Development Grant Program is to Marion County and that every job the program creates expands the local tax base, which helps the county provide its services and programs. She added that many of the jobs created are tied to agriculture which is Marion County's number one industry.

MOTION: Commissioner Carlson moved approval of an order approving Video Lottery Funds for Economic Development grants to Fiber-Fab, LLC for \$35,000, and Gilgamesh Brewing for \$35,000. Seconded by Commissioner Milne; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

PUBLIC WORKS

2. Consider approval of an order setting camping fees at Marion County's Bear Creek Park. – Jeff Bickford and Russ Dilley

Environmental Services Division Manager Jeff Bickford introduced Parks Coordinator Russ Dilley and gave a PowerPoint presentation that described Bear Creek Park and Campground's location, phases of development, proposed fees, and projected revenues (Attachment B). He added that Marion County has received four grants from the Oregon Recreation and Park Department for the development of Bear Creek Park and Campground.

Commissioner Milne said that Environmental Services has kept the board informed throughout the development of the park and explained that the comparative fee study ensures the county will stay competitive. Commissioner Milne asked why Bear Creek Park was selected as the county's first overnight campground. Mr. Bickford said that the Marion County Parks Master Plan calls for the county to provide opportunities for overnight camping and that Bear Creek Park's geographical location and terrain made it a desirable site for overnight camping. He added that in the future, Minto County Park near Gates might offer opportunities for overnight camping.

Mr. Bickford said that the majority of the county's Parks Division is funded by recreation vehicle (RV) registration fees allocated by the state and that the county will benefit by adding the overnight camping. Commissioner Carlson said that she had served on the County Parks Assistance Advisory Committee, which is the committee that determines which counties receive grant funds, and that while serving on that committee she was amazed at the large amounts of money being allocated to Linn County, Columbia River Gorge counties, and coastal counties

because they offered overnight camping. She said now Marion County has an opportunity through this grant program to get amenities in our parks that the county is not able to fund through the regular budget process. Commissioner Carlson added that Mr. Dilley in the only paid employee in the county's Parks Division and that he works with numerous volunteers.

Commissioner Brentano asked how many campsites are available at Bear Creek Park and Campground. Mr. Bickford said there are a total of 15 campsites. Two walk-in campsites and one pull-through campsite for large RVs. There is no reservation process and the campsites are offered on a first come, first serve basis.

Parks Coordinator Russ Dilley formally thanked the operations crews, bridge crew, Juvenile crews, county electrician, and county plumber for helping to get Bear Creek Park and Campground up and running.

MOTION: Commissioner Milne moved approval of an order setting fees at Marion County's Bear Creek Park. Seconded by Commissioner Carlson; motion carried. A voice vote was unanimous.

Camp Preparation Overview


- Began development in 2011
- Leveraged a series of four grants over four years from the Oregon Parks & Recreation Department
 - Phase 1 (2011/2012):
- Drill water well
- Construct well pumphouse
- Install water pipes and pipestands
- Extend electrical service from the road to the site
- Perform initial brush clearing
- Phase 2 (2012/2013):
- Septage holding tank for host installed
- Woodshed built
- Grey water sumps installed (for camper wash water)
- Gravel parking pads placed





Camp Preparation Overview (cont.)

- Phase 3 (2013):
- New vault toilet purchased and installed
- Phase 4 (2014):
- Asphalt pad for host site installed
- Installation of signs, picnic tables, fire pits/BBQ's, and the iron ranger pay station


