Measure No: 111

Measure Designation: Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly

Caption: Amends Constitution: State must ensure affordable healthcare access, balanced against requirement to fund schools, other essential services

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote requires state to ensure affordable healthcare access. State must balance healthcare funding against funding for schools, other essential services; courts must respect balance.

Result of No: "No" vote retains current law. The constitution does not require the state to ensure access to affordable health care; state provides some healthcare access.

Summary: Amends Constitution. Current state law outlines the general requirements for health insurance policies and provides health care for low income and disabled residents who meet eligibility requirements. Amends the Oregon Constitution to establish health care as a fundamental right; obligates the state to provide Oregon residents "access to cost-effective, clinically appropriate and affordable health care." Amendment requires the state to balance that obligation against the public interest in funding public schools and other essential public services. If the state is sued to enforce the amendment, the court may not order a remedy that interferes with the state's requirement to balance healthcare funding against funding for public schools and other essential public services.

Financial Impact: The financial impact to state and local expenditure and revenue is indeterminate. The measure does not require additional state government revenues or expenditures. The impact of the measure will depend on future legislative action to establish additional health benefits and determine how they will be paid for.

Measure No: 112

Measure Designation: Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly

Caption: Amends Constitution: Removes language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote amends constitution to remove language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime; allows programs to be ordered as part of sentencing.

Result of No: "No" vote retains current language that generally prohibits slavery and involuntary servitude but allows slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime.

Summary: Amends Constitution. Article I, section 34 of the Oregon Constitution currently prohibits slavery and involuntary servitude but allows an exception to that prohibition as a punishment for crime. Measure removes language that allows slavery and involuntary servitude as a punishment for crime. Under measure, a court or probation or parole agency is allowed to order a person convicted of a crime to engage in education, counseling, treatment, community service, or other alternatives to incarceration, as part of sentencing for the crime. Ordered programs must be in line with programs that historically, or in the future, have been in place to provide for accountability, reformation, protection of society, or rehabilitation. Effect on current constitutional provisions requiring inmate work programs unclear.

Financial Impact: The financial impact to state and local expenditures and revenues is indeterminate. The measure removes language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as a punishment for a crime. The measure does not require additional state government revenues or expenditures however the impact of the measure will depend on potential legal action or changes to inmate work programs.

Measure No: 113

Measure Designation: Proposed by Initiative Petition

Caption: Amends Constitution: Legislators with ten unexcused absences from floor sessions disqualified from holding next term of office

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote disqualifies legislators with ten unexcused absences from legislative floor sessions from holding office as legislator for term following current term of office.

Result of No: "No" vote retains existing law. Absent legislators may be punished by legislative chamber (potentially expelled by supermajority); present legislators have legal authority to compel attendance.

Summary: Amends Oregon Constitution to add language prescribing consequences for unexcused absences by legislators from floor sessions. Currently, Senators and Representatives may be "punished" or, by the concurrence of two-thirds of the Senator's or Representative's chamber, "expelled" for "disorderly behavior," but law does not define "disorderly behavior." Additionally, absent legislators may be "compelled" to attend legislative floor sessions, but current law does not specify consequences for unexcused absences. Measure specifies that "disorderly behavior" includes legislator's failure to attend ten or more legislative floor sessions during a regular or special legislative session without permission or excuse. Under measure, legislator who engages in "disorderly behavior" through unexcused absences is disqualified from serving as a Senator or Representative for the term following the end of the legislator's current term.

Financial Impact: This measure will have no financial effect on either state or local government expenditures or revenues.

Measure No: 114

Measure Designation: Proposed by Initiative Petition

Caption: Requires permit to acquire firearms; police maintain permit/firearm database; criminally prohibits certain ammunition magazines

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote requires background check, safety training, fee for permit to acquire firearms; state police maintain new permit/ firearm database; criminally prohibits certain magazines; exceptions.

Result of No: "No" vote retains current law: seller/ transferor must request criminal background check; permit, safety course not required; no magazine capacity restrictions.

Summary: Oregon law currently allows persons over age 18 to acquire firearms (federal law requires age 21 for some handgun purchases), seller/ transferor must request criminal background check. Measure requires permit from local law enforcement to acquire firearm; person must pay fee, submit photo ID, fingerprints, complete approved safety training, pass criminal background check, not be prohibited from possessing firearms; officer may deny permit to person believed danger to self or others. Permit issued within 30 days, valid 5 years. Permit denials appealable. Must present permit, pass background check to acquire firearm. State Police creates/ maintains permit/ firearm database. Magazines over 10 rounds, or readily modifiable to exceed 10 rounds, prohibited; exception for current owners /inheritors. Exceptions for law enforcement, armed forces. Criminal penalties. Other provisions.

Financial Impact: The intent of the measure is for revenues from permits to cover administrative costs. Cost estimates related to the measure were received from state and local government. However, there is uncertainty in the assumptions regarding the estimates made, including the projections of the number of permit applications, the revenue associated with those permits and other related costs. There is also uncertainty in potential cost savings to state and local government expenditures due to an expected decrease in firearm related injuries and death. Therefore, the financial impact of Measure 114 for state and local governments is indeterminate.

Measure No: 24-465

Caption: PROHIBITS PSILOCYBIN MANUFACTURING AND SERVICE CENTERS IN UNINCORPORATED MARION COUNTY.

Question: Shall Psilocybin product manufacturing and service centers be prohibited in Marion County's unincorporated areas (outside of city limits)?

Summary: Psilocybin is a psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms. State law (ORS Chapter 475A) allows the operation of Psilocybin product manufacturing and service centers. ORS 475A.718 also allows a county governing body to adopt an ordinance prohibiting Psilocybin manufacturing and service centers within the unincorporated area of the county.

The Marion County Board of Commissioners adopted an ordinance prohibiting Psilocybin manufacturing and service centers from operating within the unincorporated areas of Marion County.

Pursuant to ORS 475A.718 this ordinance has been referred to the electors to determine whether Psilocybin manufacturing and service centers will be prohibited from operating within the unincorporated areas of Marion County.

Approval of this measure would prohibit (not allow) the establishment of Psilocybin manufacturing and service centers in unincorporated Marion County.

Measure No: 24-470

Caption: Prohibits psilocybin-related businesses within the Aumsville

Question: Shall Aumsville prohibit psilocybin-related businesses from operating in the City?

Summary: State law allows for the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale, and purchase of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms. State law provides that a local government may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers.

The Aumsville City Council adopted an ordinance to refer to the voters prohibiting psilocybin-related businesses from operating in Aumsville. Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the Aumsville city limits.

Measure No: 24-471

Caption: Allows certain marijuana-related facilities within Aumsville

Question: Shall Aumsville allow medical marijuana dispensaries, marijuana retailers, marijuana processing sites, marijuana producers, marijuana wholesalers in the City?

Summary: State law allows for the operation of registered medical marijuana processors and dispensaries as well as for the operation of OLCC-licensed recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers, and retailers.

State law also permits the voters of a city to adopt an ordinance that prohibits the establishment of any of these registered or licensed facilities within the city.

Aumsville voters adopted Ordinance 644 in November 2016 prohibiting such registered and licensed facilities within City limits. If approved, this measure would repeal and replace Ordinance 644 to allow registered medical marijuana dispensaries, marijuana retailers, medical marijuana processing sites, marijuana producers, marijuana processors, and marijuana wholesalers to operate within the City. Such facilities would still have to comply with other applicable laws, such as zoning code requirements.

Measure No: 24-472

Caption: Authorizing tax on recreational retail sales of marijuana items

Question: Shall Aumsville impose a tax on the sale of marijuana items sold by recreational retailers as permitted by state law?

Summary: Under a state law, cities may adopt ordinances imposing up to a three percent tax or fee on the sale of recreational marijuana items in the city by state-licensed marijuana retailers as long as the ordinance is referred to the voters for approval at the next statewide general election. This measure seeks the required voter approval for the City to impose a tax on the retail sale of all marijuana items sold by an OLCC-licensed marijuana retailer in the City in an amount equal to the maximum allowed by state law, which is currently equal to three percent.

If this measure is approved, the City would be authorized to impose a three percent tax on recreational marijuana sales in Aumsville and increase the amount of the tax if and when state law permits such increases.

City of Detroit

Measure No: 24-466

Caption: Adopt a City Charter to replace the current City Charter

Question: Shall the City of Detroit adopt a new City Charter to replace the current City Charter?

Summary: The new Charter would change the qualifications for those eligible to serve in elective office, how nominations for the city council occurs, and remove the difference in status for primary and non-primary residents. Residents no longer would be either primary or non-primary with any qualified elector ligible to serve in an elective office, including the office of mayor.

Nomination petitions would be required with not fewer than fifteen elector's signatures rather than the current requirement of twenty. Charter language concerning procedures for public improvements, Section 33. Procedure is simplified in Section 35. Debt is proposed to be changed to be consistent with the League of Oregon Cities Model Charter for Oregon Cities, 2018 edition.

Other changes are proposed to correct misspellings and formatting issues in the existing Charter without changing intent. Other changes remove gender-exclusive references so the proposed Charter contains no gender-exclusive references.

Question: Shall the City of Hubbard declare a temporary ban prohibiting psilocybin-related businesses and manufacture of psilocybin products within Hubbard?

Summary: State law allows for the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale, and purchase of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms. State law provides that a local government may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers.

The Hubbard City Council adopted an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within the City for a period of two years, which was referred to the voters per state law.

The two-year prohibition is intended to provide additional time for the City to enact reasonable time, place, and manner restrictions on licensed facilities.

Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within Hubbard city limits until December 31, 2024.

City of Salem

Measure No: 24-474

Caption: City of Salem Community Capital Improvements General Obligation Bond Authorization

Question: Shall Salem issue up to \$300,000,000 in bonds for streets, fire equipment, parks, affordable housing, libraries, technology, and public safety?

Summary: The City of Salem seeks approval to issue general obligation bonds to finance capital costs of projects expected to include:

Fire equipment, including fire engines and ladder trucks; Affordable housing; Construction and repair of streets and sidewalks, sidewalk connections and the Pringle Creek Path; Repairs to some bridges; Replacement of playground equipment at certain parks; Construction of coverings in certain parks; Construction and repair of City facilities; Two fire stations, two branch libraries and affordable housing; Technology improvements including cybersecurity and financial reporting system; Capitalized interest and costs of bond issuance.

Bond principal would not exceed \$300,000,000. Bonds may be issued in multiple series; each maturing within 30 years from issuance. The measure is not expected to increase Salem's bond tax rate above the current rate of \$1.20/\$1,000 of assessed value thanks to payments for existing bonds decreasing in the future. This is the current approximate rate experienced by Salem taxpayers. Actual rates may vary based upon interest rates incurred and changes in assessed value.
