A Message from the Clerk . . .

Dear Marion County Voter,

We look forward to receiving your voted ballot. If you have not received your ballot by October 25, please call us at 503-588-5041.

I encourage everyone, who is qualified, to register and vote. Please spread the word. You are qualified to register at 16 and vote at 18. After incarceration, all ex-felons are allowed to vote in Oregon.

Check your registration status at www.oregonvotes.gov and update if necessary.

Please be sure we have both your current residential and mailing address. This helps determine which of the 142 unique ballot styles to send to you. You can check and, if necessary, update this information online at www.oregonvotes.gov. Prospective voters with an Oregon Driver License or ID card can also register online by October 16 for this November Election. Alternately, use the registration form on page 55.

If you wait until after October 30 to return your ballot, please use an official ballot drop site instead of the mail to assure we receive your ballot in time to count it. See the list of drop sites on pages 4 and 5.

We check every signature. If notified via mail, please come to the Clerk's office to resolve any missing or non-matching signature issue by November 20 so we can count your ballot.

Please sign up today at www.co.marion.or.us/co to track your ballot with text, email or voice alerts. This allows you to know where your ballot is in the process and allows us to contact you quickly if there is a signature issue. We need to match each signature before we can open the envelope to count the ballot.

The United States Postal Service is offering a new service, Informed Delivery, where you receive an email with an image of your mail pieces to be delivered that day. With this, you will know when your ballot hits your mail box. To sign up for this service, go to www.informedelivery.usps.com.

Do you know of someone who, because of reading impairment or disability, needs voting assistance? Please contact us. We offer several options to help people vote privately and independently. Some are listed on page 6. We also offer large print and tactile ballots. This voter pamphlet is available in voice and text on our website. Independent Living Resources, 503-232-7411, will mail this voter pamphlet on USB thumb drive, CD or tape on request.

Thank you for helping make democracy work by being informed and voting. You are welcome to observe our election process. Call or visit for details.

- October 16 * Last day to register to vote.
- October 17 * Ballots mailed.
- October 30 * Recommended last day to mail ballot for USPS delivery by Election Day.
- November 6 * Last day to return ballots into an official drop box anywhere in Oregon before 8PM.
- November 20 * Last to resolve a missing or non-matching signature in time for ballot to be counted.





Review the Ballot Packet

It should contain at least the following items:


- Printed ballot(s)
- A pre-addressed return envelope
- Secrecy sleeve
- Inserts for State and Local Measures, Ballot Drop Sites and Track Your Ballot

If any items are missing, contact Marion County Clerk - Elections.

Important Ballot Information:

If a ballot has been delivered to your address and it is addressed to someone who does not live at your address:

1. Mark through the address like this:



2. Return to your mailbox, post office or letter carrier.

Notify Marion County Clerk's Office Before Voting The Ballot Delivered To You If:

- Your name is different than that on the label; or
- Your residence address has changed; or
- You have added, deleted or changed a mailing address.


To make sure your vote counts:

- Use a **black or blue ink pen**.
- Completely fill in the box to the left of your choice.
- To vote on a measure or candidate, complete the box next to either the "Yes" or "No" or the candidate name,




To Vote:

Use a black or blue ink pen to completely fill in the box to the left of your choice.



To Correct a Mistake:

Draw a line through the entire measure response or candidate's name. You then have the option of making another choice.



To Vote a Write-In:

To vote for a candidate not printed on the ballot, fill in the box provided to the left of "Write-In:", and print the first and last name of your choice on the line.



Important to Remember: Your Return Envelope must be Received by 8 PM Election Night and Signed or your Ballot will not be Counted.

SAMPLE BALLOT November 6, 2018 • General Election

This sample ballot is a composite of all contests and measures appearing on ballots in Marion County.
Not all voters will vote on every office or measure.

If you have more than one candidate filed for an office on your ballot, you may notice that the names do not appear in alphabetical order as might be expected. A “random alphabet” is drawn by the Secretary of State for every election which determines the order in which the names of candidates will appear on the ballot.

State Measures

Measures 102: Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly

Amends Constitution: Allows local bonds for financing affordable housing with nongovernmental entities. Requires voter approval, annual audits

Result of "Yes" Vote: "Yes" vote allows local governments to issue bonds to finance affordable housing with nongovernmental entities. Requires local voters' approval of bonds, annual audits, public reporting.

Result of "No" Vote: "No" vote retains constitutional prohibition on local governments raising money for/ loaning credit to nongovernmental entities; no exception for bonds to pay for affordable housing.

Measures 103-106: Proposed by Initiative Petition

Measure 103

Amends Constitution: Prohibits taxes/fees based on transactions for "groceries" (defined) enacted or amended after September 2017

Result of "Yes" Vote: "Yes" vote amends Constitution; prohibits state/local taxes/fees based on transactions for "groceries" (defined), including those on sellers/distributors, enacted/amended after September 2017.

Result of "No" Vote: "No" vote retains state/local government authority to enact/amend taxes (includes corporate minimum tax), fees, on transactions for "groceries" (defined), including on sellers/distributors.

Measure 104

Amends Constitution: Expands (beyond taxes) application of requirement that three-fifths legislative majority approve bills raising revenue

Result of "Yes" Vote: "Yes" vote expands "bills for raising revenue," which require three-fifths legislative majority, to include (beyond taxes) fees and changes to tax exemptions, deductions, credits.

Result of "No" Vote: "No" vote retains current law that bills for raising revenue, which require three-fifths legislative majority, are limited to bills that levy/increase taxes

Measure 105

Repeals law limiting use of state/local law enforcement resources to enforce federal immigration laws

Result of "Yes" Vote: "Yes" vote repeals law limiting (with exceptions) use of state/local law enforcement resources for detecting/apprehending persons suspected only of violating federal immigration laws.

Result of "No" Vote: "No" vote retains law limiting (with exceptions) use of state /local law enforcement resources for detecting/apprehending persons suspected only of violating federal immigration laws.

Measure 106

Amends Constitution: Prohibits spending "public funds" (defined) directly/indirectly for "abortion" (defined); exceptions; reduces abortion access

Result of "Yes" Vote: "Yes" vote amends constitution, prohibits spending "public funds" (defined) directly/indirectly for any "abortion" (defined), health plans/insurance covering "abortion"; limited exceptions; reduces abortion access.

Result of "No" Vote: "No" vote retains current law that places no restrictions on spending public funds for abortion or health plans covering abortion when approved by medical professional.

Measure 24-430

City of Gates

Prohibits certain marijuana registrants and licensees in Gates, Oregon.

Question: Shall Gates prohibit medical marijuana processors, medical marijuana dispensaries, recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers and retailers within Gates city limits?

Measure 24-431

Gates Rural Fire Protection District

Annexation occurred before a ruling by the Appellant Court has now brought a developer lawsuit. Taxes, fees and bond assessments will continue to rise until the fiascos stop or are scaled way back. Combine empty downtown lot with an influx of homeless, add tiny house villages everywhere, then I see decline and slums at Silverton's doorstep.

St Edwards church announced their wish to transition homeless women in a manner that seemed reasonable. But the modest St Edwards proposal could be achieved in a much simpler manner than passing a massively expanded city-wide code change that will make all of Silverton a beacon to homeless drifting into town.

Finding simpler and realistic alternatives springing from citizen input rather than rushing a plethora of sweeping changes made by a small closed group is always preferable.







Prohibits certain marijuana registrants and licensees in Gates, Oregon.

Question: Shall Gates prohibit medical marijuana processors, medical marijuana dispensaries, recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers and retailers within Gates city limits?

Summary:
ORS 250.035(1)(c)

State law allows operation of registered medical marijuana processors, medical marijuana dispensaries and licensed recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers and retailers. Citizens in municipalities may initiate the adoption of an ordinance to be placed on the ballot to vote to prohibit the establishment of any of those registered or licensed activities.

Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment and operation of medical marijuana processors, medical marijuana dispensaries, recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers and retailers subject to the jurisdiction of the City of Gates.

If this measure is approved, the city will be ineligible to receive distributions of state marijuana tax revenues and will not be able to collect on the local tax or fee that has already been passed on the production, processing or sale of marijuana or any product into which marijuana has been incorporated.

Explanatory Statement:

Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment and operation of certain marijuana activities within the city.

The Oregon Medical Marijuana Act, as amended by the Legislature in 2015, provides that the Oregon Health Authority will register medical marijuana processors and medical marijuana dispensaries. Medical marijuana processors compound or convert marijuana into concentrates, extracts, edible products, and other products intended for human consumption and use. Medical marijuana dispensaries facilitate the transfer of marijuana and marijuana products between patients, caregivers, processors and growers. Measure 91, approved by Oregon voters in 2014 and by the Legislature in 2015, provides that the Oregon Liquor Control Commission will license recreational marijuana producers (those who manufacture, plant, cultivate, grow or harvest marijuana) processors, wholesalers, and retailers.

A city council may adopt an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of any of those entities within the city, but the council must refer the ordinance to the voters at

Explanatory Statement cont:

a statewide general election.

If approved, this measure would prohibit medical marijuana processors, medical marijuana dispensaries, and recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers, and retailers with the city. Medical marijuana processors and medical marijuana dispensaries that were registered with state before the adoption of the ordinance, and medical marijuana dispensaries that had applied to be registered on or before July 1, 2015, can continue operation in the city even if this measure is approved, if those entities have successfully completed a local land use application process.

Approval of this measure has revenue impacts. Currently, ten percent of the state marijuana tax revenue will be distributed to cities to assist local law enforcement in performing their duties under measure 91. If approved, this measure would make the city ineligible to receive distributions of state marijuana tax revenues.

Currently, under the 2015 legislation, a city may impose up to three percent tax on the sale of marijuana items by a marijuana retailer in the city. However, a city that adopts an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of medical marijuana processors, medical marijuana dispensaries, or recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers, or retailers may not impose a local tax or fee on the production, processing or sale of marijuana or any product into which marijuana has been incorporated. Approval of this measure would therefore prevent a city from imposing a local tax on those activities.

Renewal of current four-year local option tax for general operations.

Question: Shall Gates RFPD retain the option tax of \$.9033 per \$100,000 of assessed value for operations/equipment for another four years? This measure renews current local option taxes.

Summary:

Approval of this four year local option serial levy would continue the current fire district levy through June 2023. The levy would begin July 1, 2019 and would provide funding for the Gates RFPD to maintain the current level of emergency services and meet the fire district's increasing operating costs. Additional revenues would fund the upgrade or replacement of district vehicles and equipment. The proposed rate would generate approximately \$59,436 in 2019/2020; \$60,585 in 2020/2021; \$62,251 in 2021/2022; and \$63,962 in 2022/2023.

Explanatory Statement:

Voter approval of this four year local option serial levy would continue the current fire district levy through June 2023. This four year extension is a continuation of an existing tax and is not a new tax. This same rate was approved in five prior elections (November 1998), November 2002, November 2006, November 2010, and November 2014). It would take effect July 1, 2019 and expire June 30, 2023. The funds provided by the Local Option Tax revenue would be used to continue operating the District's emergency service program at its current level. It would also allow for growth of needed services; support operations of facilities; upgrade critical equipment; support of staff and administrative services, and continue funding to support purchase of a new water tender.

Can I Vote?

Renewal of five-year tax levy at current rate.

Question: Shall district impose \$.59 per \$1,000 of assessed value for general operations for five years beginning in 2019-2020? This measure renews current local option taxes.

Summary: Keizer Fire District's current local option levy of \$.59 per \$1,000 of assessed value expires June 30, 2019. This measure will renew the current levy for another five years at the same rate of \$.59 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The new levy would start July 1, 2019 after the current levy expires. If adopted, the District will use the tax revenue from this measure to continue to operate the District at its present level of service and continue to improve current operations. The levy would allow the District to provide adequate staffing, to respond to fire and medical emergencies, and pay for the costs of the District's 9-1-1 dispatch services.

The first year of this five-year levy will be fiscal year 2019-2020. The proposed rate will raise approximately \$1,456,107.99 in 2019-2020, \$1,499,791.22 in 2020-2021, \$1,544,784.96 in 2021-2022, \$1,591,128.51 in 2023-2024, and \$1,638,862.37 in 2024-2025, for a total of \$7,730,675.05.

Explanatory Statement:

In November 2013, Keizer Fire District voters approved a five-year local option levy at the rate of \$.59 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. That levy expires in June, 2019. This measure will renew the current levy for another five years at the current rate of \$.59 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value.

The Keizer Fire District Board of Directors voted unanimously on July 17, 2018 to seek voter approval of this funding measure on the November ballot. The Board is asking Keizer Fire District residents to extend the current five-year local option levy that is expiring. A "Yes" vote would allow funding for the Fire District for the next five years at its present level of service to improve ambulance staffing, and cover the costs of providing 9-1-1 communications as required by law.

The Fire District relies heavily on the use of levy funding to fulfill its mission. The Fire District is served by 20 volunteer and 35.5 career personnel.

In 2017, the District had emergency responses totaling 5,419 which represent a 15.7% increase. Of those responses, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) accounted for over 80% of those responses. Even with the increase in calls, Keizer Fire District responds to emergency calls in less than six minutes 93% of the time. The remaining responses were for

fires, rescues and calls for assistance. Fire District ambulances and EMS personnel are funded through this local option levy which voters previously approved in 2008 and in 2013.

With increasing costs and increasing call volume, this levy is needed to continue the same level of services to our community.

The Fire District's permanent tax rate is \$1.3526 per \$1,000 of assessed property valuation. The Board of Directors has determined that revenue received from the permanent tax rate is insufficient to maintain the present level of service for the next five years. To fund operations the District requires the levy funding to meet emergency response needs in our community.

Keizer Fire District is not a part of the city or county. The Fire District is a "special district," a separate unit of government, similar to a city or county. It was created by a vote of the people in 1948. It is governed by an elected Board of Directors who are residents of the District. As elected representatives, their responsibility is to represent the interests of District residents by making policy decisions that ensure the highest level of fire services, emergency medical services, and life safety services provided in the most cost effective manner. The District also has a budget committee made up of the Board of Directors and five District citizens that makes recommendations on District expenditures.

Even with approval of this levy, Keizer Fire District will continue to remain at a lower tax rate for Fire and EMS services than neighboring City of Salem or Marion County Fire District.



Local Option Levy to Maintain Fire and Emergency Medical Operations

Question: Shall the District levy \$0.35 per \$1,000.00 of assessed value for five years beginning 2019-2020 for fire and emergency operations? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

Summary: Woodburn Fire Protection District provides fire, emergency medical, and rescue services to the residents of Woodburn, Gervais and the surrounding area. District operations are funded through property taxes.

If adopted, this levy would ensure that four firefighter/medics are on duty each day including a paramedic with advanced life support skills. The District currently has a limited number of paramedics on staff.

In addition, if adopted, the levy funds would:

- Provide advanced life support training to select personnel to bring near emergency room level of assistance to patients having a medical emergency.
- Retain all current firefighter/medics to allow more immediate action to fight fire and save lives without needing to wait for additional responders to arrive.
- Help the District's ability to cover multiple emergency calls that occur on a near daily basis in the District.

For a home assessed at \$160,000, about average for the District, the cost of the proposed levy would be about \$56 for the first year.

The requested rate will raise approximately \$717,062 in 2019-2020; \$738,574 in 2020-2021; \$760,731 in 2021-2022; \$783,553 in 2022-2023, and; \$807,060 in 2023-2024. The estimated tax cost is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of estimate and may reflect the impact of early payment discounts, compression and the collection rate.

The Woodburn Fire Protection District is seeking approval of a local option levy in the amount of \$0.35 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

What Services does the District provide?

Woodburn Fire District is the first responder for fire, medical emergencies and rescue operations in its service area. The District also provides fire prevention, fire investigations, public education and public assists.

Explanatory Statement: (cont.)

Who does the District serve?

Woodburn Fire District serves an approximate 75 square mile area of the Willamette Valley including the communities of Woodburn, Gervais, Waconda, and Broadacres.

How is the District Funded?

Woodburn Fire is funded through a permanent property tax base. In addition, voters approved a 20-year bond measure in 2002 for the improvement of the main station and the purchase of three fire engines and a ladder truck.

How would levy funds be used?

If approved, the levy funds would:

- **Help Provide Advanced Life Support Service.** Levy funds would be used to ensure that a firefighter paramedic with advanced life support training is on-duty at all times. Woodburn Fire District personnel with Advanced Life Support skills would be capable of bringing near emergency room level care to patients in medical emergencies. The District currently has a limited number of personnel with paramedic training. Funds from the levy would be used to train select personnel to the paramedic skill level.
- **Help Provide More Immediate Life Saving Action at Emergencies.** Levy funds will help to ensure that four firefighter/medics, including one paramedic, are on duty at all times in the Woodburn Fire District. When four firefighter/medics arrive at the scene of an emergency within minutes after a call is received, they would be able to take more immediate action to fight fire and save lives without needing to wait for additional responders. A four member medical response team would provide better medical care by ensuring tasks such as high performance CPR, breathing assistance, electronic heart monitoring and emergency radio communication with hospital and ambulance personnel can all be done at the same time.
- **Help Maintain the Ability to Handle Multiple Emergency Calls.** Levy funds would help maintain the Fire District's ability to handle multiple emergency calls at the same time without having to wait up to 15 minutes for back-up from nearby fire districts and volunteer firefighters. Multiple emergency calls occur on a near daily basis in the District.

What is the cost to the taxpayers?

The levy cost for property assessed at \$160,000, about average for residential property in the Woodburn Fire District, would be approximately \$56 per year or about \$5 per month.

What if the levy is not approved?

While maintaining emergency response services would remain the top priority for the District, if the levy is not approved, the District would likely need to lay-off two firefighter/medics due to inflation and other rising costs. Without these additional firefighter/medics, life-saving action at fires, medical emergencies, and motor vehicle accidents would be delayed while waiting for additional responders.

Three- Year Local Option Tax for City Operations

Question: Shall St. Paul assess \$1.50 per \$1,000.00 of assessed value for City operations for three years beginning 2018-19? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent (3%).

Summary: The City of St. Paul is faced with a variety of important issues including land use planning, housing development, and resource protection. At the present time, two part-time employees, limited consultant assistance, and volunteer citizen efforts are addressing these issues.

The City of St. Paul permanent tax rate provides approximately \$24,429 per year which is not adequate to fund the necessary and required functions of the city, including:

- Street lighting
- Police protection
- Land use planning
- Housing development
- Resource protection
- Budget and financial management
- Insurance
- General administration
- Professional services: auditing, legal, engineering and planning

The requested rate will raise approximately \$59,516.00 in fiscal year 2018-19.

This measure is subject to the limits of Section 11(b), Article XI of the Oregon Constitution. The revenues raised will be for government purposes other than schools.

Explanatory Statement:

What does the measure propose?

This three (3) year local option tax would assess a tax of \$1.50 per \$1,000.00 assessed value, to renew the tax that expired November 30, 2017. This local option tax would be in addition to the City's permanent tax rate of \$0.6157. This tax revenue would go into the City's General Fund.

What is the General Fund?

The General Fund pays for City expenditures not covered by the City's sewer, water, and street revenues which are dedicated funds. The General Fund covers such services as street lighting, police via the Marion County Sheriff's Office, land-

use planning, housing development, budget and financial management, record keeping, insurance, administration, and professional services for auditing, legal, engineering and planning.

Why is this additional General Fund Revenue for St. Paul proposed?

The City currently receives funding from a permanent tax rate of \$0.6157 and received temporary local option tax of \$1.50 to supplement the General Fund until such tax expired November 30, 2017. Without additional tax revenue, the City must rely on the permanent tax rate to support services. If this measure is approved, the City would be authorized to impose a total local option tax of approximately \$59,516.00 each year over fiscal years 2019-20, 2020-21, 2021-22.

The City is legally required to carry out General Fund functions relating to a variety of issues such as land-use planning, development, budgeting, and record keeping. These issues are currently being addressed by two part-time employees, limited consultant assistance, and citizen volunteer contributions. The local option tax is being proposed to provide a greater level of City services and office administration.

How much tax revenue would St. Paul collect if the option levy passed?

The property tax rate for the City of St. Paul if the option levy passed would be a combination of two separate taxes (permanent and local option) totaling approximately \$2.12 per \$1,000.00 of assessed value. If voters approve the proposed local option tax, the City's combined tax rate at approximately this rate would be effective from November 1, 2019 to November 30, 2021.

What should citizens know about the requested local option tax?

Under state law, the City cannot increase its permanent tax rate. It may ask voters to approve temporary tax measures. The revenues from the measure must be put into a designated fund and can only be used for the purpose stated in the measure. If this measure is approved, the City would collect the first year's revenue beginning in fiscal year 2019-20. If the local option tax is not approved, the City will continue to only collect taxes at the permanent tax rate of \$0.6157 per \$1,000.00 of assessed value.

The impact of the proposed levy on an individual homeowner would vary by the value of the home. At the proposed combined rate of \$2.12, property taxes on a \$250,000.00 home would be \$530.00 per year.

Measure proposing amendments to the City of Jefferson Charter

Question: Shall amendments to the Charter for the City of Jefferson be adopted?

Summary: Approving this measure would adopt amendments to the City's Charter. The City's Charter was last updated in 2010. If approved, the Charter amendments to Sections 3, 17, 18, and 20 would take effect January 1, 2019.

The proposed amendments address annexation by clarifying that annexation proposals shall be put to a popular vote of the electorate unless state law specifically directs to the contrary. The amendments also address the role of the Mayor by deleting the Mayor's authority to create a tie vote on questions before the Council and revising the requirement that the Mayor countersign all City checks. Lastly, the amendments clarify the procedure the Council uses to select the Council President. The City Council's intent in proposing these amendments is to modernize these Charter provisions and ensure the Charter conforms to state law.

Adoption of the proposed City Charter amendments requires a vote of the people. A complete copy of the proposed City Charter amendments is available for review at City of Jefferson City Hall, 150 North 2nd Street.

Explanatory Statement:

The Jefferson City Council is proposing these updates to the City Charter. The proposal would make amendments to four sections of the Charter, Sections 3, 17, 18, and 20. If approved, the Charter amendments would take effect January 1, 2019.

The proposed amendment to Section 3 would clarify that annexation proposals will be put to a popular vote of the electorate, unless state law specifically directs to the contrary. The City Council's intent with this amendment is to take account of recent changes in state law, while still preserving to the extent possible the City's history of putting annexation decisions to a popular vote.

The proposed amendments to Sections 17 and 20 address the Mayor's role in City government. The

change to Section 17 deletes the Mayor's authority to create a tie vote on questions before the Council. The Mayor would still vote to break a tie. The change to Section 20 deletes the *requirement* that the Mayor countersign all City checks. The Mayor would still be an authorized signer on City checks.

The proposed amendment to Section 18 is intended to clarify the procedure the City Council uses to select the Council President by stating that the Council President will be selected by a "vote" of the Council rather than by "ballot."

The City Council's intent in proposing these amendments is to modernize these Charter provisions and ensure the Charter conforms to state law.

Three Percent Tax on Marijuana Sales

Question: Shall the City of Turner enact an additional tax of up to 3 percent on all retail marijuana sales.

Summary: Municipalities can enact an additional tax of up to 3%, with the approval of voters, on all retail marijuana sales. A vote in favor of this question will permit the Turner City Council to enact a sales tax of up to 3% on all retail marijuana sales. A “no” vote will prohibit the City from enacting this tax.

Explanatory Statement:

Under Measure 91, adopted by Oregon voters in November 2014, codified in Oregon Revised Statutes Chapter 475B and amended by the Legislature in 2016, a City Council may adopt an ordinance imposing up to a 3% tax on the sale of marijuana items by retail licenses in the City, if supported by the voters at a statewide general election.

Currently, the City receives marijuana distribution revenue from the State as a municipality which has not banned marijuana sales.

If this measure is approved, the City Council will impose a 3% tax on all retail marijuana sales within Turner City limits, creating additional revenue for the City.

Banning New Medical and Recreational Marijuana Operations

Question: Shall new medical or recreational marijuana production, processing, wholesale or retail businesses be prohibited from operating in Turner?

Summary: Turner currently has one licensed retail marijuana business and one marijuana production business being developed. This measure, if passed, would prohibit additional marijuana production, processing, wholesale or retail marijuana businesses from being allowed in Turner. This would not affect the existing marijuana businesses in Turner.

Explanatory Statement:

On November 8th, 2016, in a countywide general election, the citizens of Turner voted to allow recreational and medical marijuana facilities. In that same election, Marion County, as a whole, voted to ban recreational and medical marijuana. In reviewing these results, the City Council noticed that the ballot questions for the City and the County were exactly opposite in wording, potentially creating confusion in the minds of Turner voters. Because of this potential confusion, on April 12, 2018, the City Council voted to refer the policy of banning or allowing recreational and medical marijuana facilities to citizens at the next general election.

Currently, one retail recreational marijuana facility has been permitted within the city, and one growing/processing facility is being reviewed. The approval or denial of this measure will not affect either of these operations, as they were permitted, or were applied for, prior to the proposed vote in November.

The approval of this measure will ban the permitting by the City of any future recreational and medical marijuana facilities.

Approval of this measure will also limit the amount of revenue the City will acquire from marijuana facilities, as no new facilities, which could generate additional revenue, will be allowed to be permitted.

A Discussion on the Security of Oregon Elections

By The Oregon Secretary of State Elections Division

Oregon elections are secure. They're secure, not because there aren't any threats, but because we have detailed processes and procedures in place that are continuously evaluated to identify improvements and to develop contingency plans, ensuring our systems and our votes are secure.

Some security measures you may be more familiar with than others. For example the signature on your ballot return envelope is compared to the signatures in your voter registration record and your ballot is only counted if the signatures match. Another security feature is that all elections in Oregon must be conducted using a paper ballot.

Other security features which you may not be as familiar with include:

- ▶ Every county elections office files a security plan with the Secretary of State every year that details the tools and processes they use to secure elections in their county.
- ▶ Each day a copy of the voter registration database is backed up and saved to ensure accurate information is preserved should a bad actor gain access.
- ▶ All voting systems (machines and programs) used to count ballots in Oregon have been certified by a federally accredited voting system test laboratory and have been further analyzed to ensure the system is secure before the Secretary of State approved of their use.
- ▶ All ballots are counted in secure rooms at each of Oregon's 36 county election offices. Security cameras are in place to record 24 hours a day. No voting systems are connected to the internet.
- ▶ Prior to any ballots being counted counties test voting systems for logic and accuracy. This testing entails marking test ballots and running them through the vote counting machines to ensure results produced by the voting machines match how the test ballots were marked. This same process is followed after the election to confirm there was no change to the programming.
- ▶ Finally, after the election and prior to certification of the results, an audit of randomly sampled ballots is conducted. This audit requires human beings to review every ballot in the random sample to prove that results produced by the vote counting machines accurately reflect the marks made by voters.

The US Department of Homeland Security and the FBI have confirmed that no vote tally systems in Oregon, or anywhere else in the US have been hacked. You can have confidence that your ballot will be counted as you mark it and that there will be no tampering with the ballot at any step in the election process. Voting in Oregon has never been more secure or more accurate.
