Regarding: Mpox

Dear Colleagues,

The first known case of clade I mpox was recently identified in California on November 16, 2024. **The risk of clade I mpox to the public remains low, and there continue to be sporadic clade II mpox cases throughout the United States.**

Immediately notify infection prevention and control personnel if a patient in your facility is suspected to have mpox. Isolate the patient in a single-person room and use PPE when entering the patient's room. Standard cleaning and disinfection procedures should be performed using an EPA-registered hospital-grade disinfectant with an emerging viral pathogen claim. Avoid activities that could resuspend dried material from the lesions. Waste contaminated with mpox is designated as Category B infectious substances.

Please consider mpox when determining the cause of a diffuse or localized rash. To assess exposure risk, take a thorough history including sexual history and recent travel during the past 3 weeks. Wearing appropriate PPE (i.e., gown, gloves, eye protection, and N95), perform a thorough physical exam including skin and mucosa (e.g., oral, genital, anal). If testing is indicated:

- Don appropriate PPE (gown, gloves, eye protection, N95 or greater respirator)
- Identify 2 to 3 lesions from different locations that differ in appearance
- Avoiding contamination of the gloved hand, vigorously swab each lesion using 2 sterile, synthetic swabs with plastic, wood, or aluminum shaft. Do not use cotton swabs and unroofing vesicles is not necessary, nor recommended.
- Place each swab in a separate sterile tube and label with at least 2 patient identifiers, date of collection, and location of lesion.
