2021 was a year of transition and recovery from the impacts of a world-wide pandemic. Volunteer programs used the time to review and realign their program goals and structure. In 2022 we saw our volunteer programs operating much closer to, or above, pre-pandemic levels. For example the number of interns grew from twenty-four students placed in 2019, to forty-seven in 2022. In all, nearly 1,400 volunteers joined us in 2022, making significant contributions to the wellbeing of Marion County.

We are grateful for Marion County volunteers! They strengthen our resolve, inspire us, and help set us on a great path for 2023 and beyond. On behalf of all our volunteers and the 50+ volunteer managers and administrative staff who support them, I'm happy to present the 2022 Volunteer Annual Report.

Spotlight: Marion County Fair

The Fair Board and Key Volunteers work year-round to plan and manage the Marion County Fair. They rely on partners and event volunteers to ensure a successful fair. Collectively volunteers manage the barns and 4H activities; food and commercial vendors; carnival and entertainment; sponsorships; competitions and exhibits; special events; facilities and parking; and all financial and budget functions. The 2022 fair welcomed over 26,000 visitors, had record breaking sponsorships, and the Junior Market Auction brought in over \$1M for participating youth. By all measures, the 2022 Marion County Fair was a success. This would not be possible without the leadership and involvement of volunteers!

Spotlight: Dog Shelter

The number of dogs coming into the shelter has steadily increased over the last few years. In 2022 the shelter received a record breaking 1,257 dogs. Standing shoulder to shoulder with staff, hundreds of volunteers donate their time to ensure the dogs in our care get the best possible outcomes. Volunteers help as clinic & shelter assistants, dog walkers, adoption assistants, Dog Day Out hosts, foster providers, and more. Clinic assistants help with the post-operative care for dogs recovering from surgery, freeing up the medical team's time; shelter assistants help with laundry, kitchen & food preparation; 106 volunteers opened their homes to foster a dog, freeing up much needed kennel space; 160+ individuals walk & socialize dogs; and dozens of volunteers assist with adoptions and outreach events. Thanks to these





dedicated volunteers, we are able to care and rehabilitate more dogs, successfully reuniting them with their owners or adopting them into a loving home.

Spotlight: Victim Advocates

Advocates help victims exercise their rights within the criminal justice system. In addition to guiding them through the legal process, volunteer advocates help clients secure protective orders and connect them with housing and other basic needs. Specially trained volunteers accompany victims of sexual assault during their forensic exam. In addition to providing direct services to clients, volunteers increase staff capacity for case management by attending community outreach events, helping with office tasks, and attending grand jury hearings.

Spotlight: Local Alcohol and Drug Planning Committee (LADPC)

Members meet monthly to advise and make recommendations on issues related to substance abuse and addiction. They drive a collaborative and effective approach, ensuring better access to services and a comprehensive approach to prevention, education, and advocacy. Members of the LADPC represent the broader community, consumers of services, partners, law enforcement, and treatment providers. The committee works with staff to identify areas of need, specific barriers to services, and system improvements. LADPC members are tireless advocates for individuals in need of addiction services, and for those who provide them.

Spotlight: Alternative Program Volunteer

Volunteer Charlie G. is committed to helping youth build their vocational and social skills, helping to reduce the chance they enter the adult criminal justice system, and increasing the odds they will find meaningful employment. With Charlie's help, youth in the Alternative Program are able to perform valuable community service while earning money for victim restitution. Charlie has been volunteering since 2015, and was recognized in 2017 with the Judge Rex Hartley Volunteer of the Year Award. Charlie isn't slowing down, and in 2022 he donated over 400 hours working directly with youth to coordinate the firewood component of the program. Charlie worked with youth to process orders, sort, load, and deliver firewood.

Spotlight: Parks Commission

The Parks Commission advise the Board of Commissioners in matters pertaining to county parks and recreation facilities. Their work on Parkdale Park ensures natural play spaces are developed, appropriate amenities are installed, and improvements made will increase accessibility. The Parks Commission also worked alongside staff and county leadership to develop the Santiam Canyon Parks Recovery Plan. While the 2020 Beachie Creek Fire had a devastating impact on our outdoor spaces in the Santiam Canyon, it has presented us with a once in a generation opportunity to forge a new vision for recreation in the Canyon. The plan restores 6 parks impacted by the 2020 wildfires, and anticipates how we recreate today and in the future.

Spotlight: Search and Rescue (SAR)

Search and Rescue volunteers provide an incredible service to the community, helping both residents and visitors alike. Their service goes beyond the core purpose of the program, and it is not uncommon to find them helping with a variety of community needs. During the ice storm, SAR volunteers provided transportation for hospital staff and assisted with Meals on Wheels deliveries. These volunteers are highly trained, receiving many hours of continuing education each year. SAR members generously give of themselves, taking time away from their families and work to provide a quality, professional service to Marion County and the surrounding area. In 2022 SAR volunteers donated well over 6,000 hours of service.



Spotlight: Administration & Special Event Volunteers

Each year, Sheriff's Office volunteers support events like the World Beat, Marion County Fair, Covered Bridge Community Thanksgiving Dinner, Shop with a Cop, National Night Out, Christmas of Hope, Harvest Fest Parade, and more. One special volunteer, Ginny B, can almost always be found helping at these events! She also provides clerical support for the Concealed Handgun Licensing (CHL) program, sending out renewal letters and scanning records. With 24,500 CHL permit holders in Marion County this is no small task, and her support frees up staff to accommodate more appointments and to focus on other work.
