SAVE THE FOOD

We all have a love for food, how it brings a community together, how it grows, its rich history, and the delicious taste, however too much is wasted. This infographic tells the tale of food waste and how we can fill our plates to value the food we harvest.

The average American family throws away one fourth of all food purchased. This is a growing problem with profound financial and environmental impacts. In Marion County, food waste accounts for 20% (by weight) of the total waste disposed. In an effort to bring awareness to the issue of food waste, Marion County is launching the Save the Food campaign. This campaign encourages families to take action by pledging to reduce food waste at home. By implementing simple food waste prevention strategies, families can make better decisions about how to plan ahead, shop smart, prep early, and properly store the food they purchase. Our goal with Save the Food is to equip

families with simple tools and tips that make it easy for the entire family to participate. Get your family involved; take the pledge, and Save the Food!

HERE ARE A FEW SIMPLE TIPS TO HELP YOU REDUCE FOOD WASTE AT HOME:

PLAN AHEAD

Plan you meals according to your family's weekly schedule. Be realistic about how many meals will be eaten at home. The time spent preparing a meal should be taken into account when creating your weekly meal plan. Having a busy schedule doesn't mean you family can't enjoy a home cooked meal.

SHOP SMART

Create a grocery list based on your meal plan before you go shopping. Having a grocery list on hand will prevent you from purchasing food items on a whim. Stick to your shopping list and avoid store specials that are based on quantity discounts on perishable food. Buying more than is needed may lead to food spoilage.

PREP EARLY

Prep the food you'll need for the week as soon as you get home from the grocery store. By washing, chopping, and properly storing fruits and vegetables you will save time on meal preparation throughout the

Learning how to properly store your food will extend its shelf life and save you ethylene which can quickly ripen nearby fruits and vegetables. You want to keep bananas, apples and tomatoes away from other fruits and vegetable unless you want to take advantage of this effect.

We are happy to share that the food waste collection program continues to successfully divert food waste from school cafeterias.


During the 2013-14 school year, the Salem-Keizer School District diverted roughly 17,000 pound of food waste from the waste stream and saved an equivalent of \$22,644 in disposal costs. At this point, we have made a successful transition from working with elementary schools to working with middle schools. So far Claggett Creek,

Houck, Straub, and Howard Street Charter School have made the commitment to separate their food waste. We hope that by the end of the 2(0) 1-15 school year two more middle schools will join the program.

We are also happy to announce that South Salem High School has recently shown interest in implementing the program. If all goes well, South Salem High School will be the first high school to separate food waste in their cafeteria. Way to go SSHS!

Going forward, we hope to have the program implemented in all middles schools by the end of the 2015-16 school year. High schools will present new challenges; especially since students are allowed to eat all over campus and they are also able to leave school grounds for lunch. We look forward to working with High School students in the hopes that this program may lead to additional learning opportunities.

STUDENT RECYCLE ART CALENDAR

Marion County and the Mid-Valley Garbage & Recycling Association are once again sponsoring an art calendar contest to promote the three R's (Reduce, Reuse and Recycle). This year's theme will be "Save the Food". We invite all K-12 students to submit colorful pictures that address what reducing waste means to them, their families, their environment and/or their future. This contest is intended to serve as a vehicle for exposing students to art in the context of resource conservation. Each student will be allowed to submit up to three drawings. A selection committee will choose fourteen illustrations to be used in the 2016 calendar. Thirteen winners will be awarded a \$50 Fred Meyer gift card along with a fantastic art kit. The grand prize winner will be awarded a \$100 Fred Meyer gift card, an art kit, and their artwork will be featured on the front cover. In addition. the public school educator whose student is selected as the grand prize winner will receive a prepaid visa valued at \$500 for

classroom use. Homeschool educators may choose a non-profit organization to donate this money to. Winners will also be honored at a televised Marion County Board of Commissioners meeting.

These products can be hazardous if used or disposed of incorrectly, carry "Caution", "Warning" or "Danger" labels, and should never be poured n a drain, flushed down a toilet, or placed in the garbage.
